Project Location:

The property is a 1.68-acre site located at Carr. PR- 3 Km 115.9 Barrio Guardarraya in the Municipality of Patillas, Puerto Rico (Parcel ID# 422-078-002-19). The proposed project parcel is located at 17.9732048, -65.9515778.

This land is currently in use with cultivated fields of vegetables and aromatic plants. It was previously used for sugar cane cultivation and livestock. The terrain has been cleared of vegetation at and around the property since the 1980s. At the west side of this parcel, the applicant owns another parcel with a house and five greenhouses, with only one in use.

Description of the Proposed Project [24 CFR 58.32; 40 CFR 1508.25]:

The proposed use of grant funds is for the construction of two greenhouses.

The proposed activity is the purchase of two greenhouses of metal pipes and plastic, to be constructed in a footprint approximately 96 feet long by 64 feet wide located at 17.9732048, -65.9515778. The greenhouses would be built side by side for growing vegetables and aromatic plants in pots.

No new water or electric power connections are required.

Statement of Purpose and Need for the Proposal [40 CFR 1508.9(b)]:

The Re-Grow Puerto Rico Urban-Rural Agriculture Program (RGRW) will increase agricultural capacity while promoting and increasing food security island wide. This Program will enhance and expand agricultural production related to economic revitalization and sustainable development activities. The purpose of this project is to increase the productivity of the farm. This agricultural project associated with the construction of two new greenhouses is in keeping with the overall objectives of the Economic Development Program.

Existing Conditions and Trends [24 CFR 58.40(a)]:

The land proposed for the two greenhouses is used for agricultural purposes. Therefore, there is no change in land use associated with the project. Some ground disturbance will be required.

Public Outreach [24 CFR 58.43]:

The local community has been very proactive in the recovery process. Puerto Rico Department of Agriculture has worked closely with the agricultural community. The project includes a FONSI / NOI-RROF in compliance with NEPA regulations for HUD.

Cumulative Impact Analysis [24 CFR 58.32]:

In accordance with 24 CFR 58.32 (Aggregation), there are no cumulative impacts associated with the proposed project. The growth of agricultural products at the farm would not increase. The project would allow more efficient processing of the agricultural products. Water use could increase to a minor degree in the two new greenhouses but would only impact the existing site water supply.

Alternatives [24 CFR 58.40(e); 40 CFR 1508.9]

The RGRW Program's goal is to increase agricultural capacity while promoting and increasing food security island-wide. This Program seeks to enhance and expand agricultural production related to economic revitalization and sustainable development activities. The applicant submitted a proposal to enhance and expand agricultural production on their property. The proposed use of grant funds will allow the applicant to expand the cultivation, processing, and delivery of agricultural products through the construction of two new greenhouses. Any alternative that would involve an off-property location would not enhance and expand agricultural production or allow for the economic development for this applicant. The actions are proposed in an area close to the residence and existing electrical connections and water supply. The proposed site has been previously cleared and used for cultivation. Alternative locations on the property would be farther from the residence and existing power and water services. Other locations could require tree removal and grading.

No Action Alternative [24 CFR 58.40(e)]:

Under the No Action Alternative, the applicant would not receive federal funding for the construction of two new greenhouses which would inhibit the economic growth opportunity that the applicant would not otherwise have under the PRDOH Re-Grow Puerto Rico program. As a result, these owners may not be able to experience the growth needed to recover and expand their agriculture activities. A provision of the grant allows for economic development for businesses. The No-Action alternative would not allow for the economic development for this applicant.

Summary of Findings and Conclusions:

The proposed activity has been found to not have any adverse effects on the environment nor is there the requirement for further consultation with any agency. There are no environmental review topics addressed that result in the need for formal compliance steps or the requirement for mitigation.









Figure 15: WILD AND SCENIC RIVERS ACT



On February 9, 2018, an allocation of Community Development Block Grant - Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) funds was approved by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) under the Federal Register Volume 83, No. 28, 83 FR 5844, to assist the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico in meeting unmet needs in the wake of Hurricanes Irma and Maria. On August 14, 2018, an additional \$8.22 billion recovery allocation was allocated to Puerto Rico Under the Federal Register Volume 83, No. 157, 83 FR 40314. With these funding allocations, the Puerto Rico Department of Housing (Housing) aims to lead a comprehensive and transparent recovery for the benefit of Puerto Rico residents.

On behalf of PRDOH and the subrecipient, the Puerto Rico Department of Agriculture, we are submitting documentation for activities proposed by Hidrocaribe del Sur Inc. in Carr. PR-3 Km 115.9 in Barrio Guardarraya in the municipality of Patillas. This undertaking will consist of the purchase and construction of two greenhouses of metal pipes and plastic, with a footprint approximately 96 feet long by 64 feet wide, with the greenhouses to be built side by side. This activity will require ground disturbance. Based on the submitted documentation, the Program requests a concurrence that a determination of No Historic Properties Affected is appropriate for this proposed project.

In compliance with Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA), the Program is responsible for identifying historic properties listed in the NRHP and any properties not listed that would be considered eligible for listing that are located within the geographic area of potential effects (APE) of the proposed project and assessing the potential effects of its undertakings on these historic properties.

Project Description (Undertaking)

The proposed activity at Hidrocaribe del Sur, Inc. is the purchase of two greenhouses of metal pipes and plastic, with a footprint approximately 96 feet long by 64 feet wide, with both greenhouses to be built side by side for growing vegetables and aromatic plants in pots, in compliance with Section 106 NHPA Effect Determination. The correct coordinates are 17.9732048, -65.9515778. At the west side of this parcel, the applicant owns another parcel with a house and five greenhouses, with only one in use. The others were damaged by Hurricane Fiona. No new water or electric power connection is required. Hidrocaribe del Sur, Inc. is located at Carr. PR- 3 Km 115.9 Barrio Guardarraya in the Municipality of Patillas. This activity will require ground disturbance. The applicant indicates that he holds a permit from the Department of Natural and Environmental Resources of Puerto Rico.

Area of Potential Effects

As defined in 36 CFR §800.16(d), the area of potential effects (APE) is the geographic area or areas within which an undertaking may directly or indirectly cause changes in the character or use of historic properties if any such properties exist. Based on this definition and the nature and scope of the Undertaking, the Program has determined that the direct APE for this rural project includes a footprint approximately of 96 feet by 64 feet. The Scope of Work #1 consists of two greenhouses to be built side by side. This land

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is currently in use with cultivated fields of vegetables and aromatic plants. It was previously used for sugar cane cultivation and livestock. The direct APE includes a 15meter buffer to all sides. The visual APE is the viewshed of the proposed project.

Identification of Historic Properties - Archaeology

Existing information on previously identified historic properties has been reviewed to determine if any such properties are located within the APE of this undertaking. The review of this existing information, by a Program contracted Historic Preservation Specialist meeting the Secretary of the Interior's Professional Qualification Standards (36 CFR Part 61), shows that there are no archaeological sites and/or NRHP listed/eligible historic properties within a half-mile radius of the property, as shown in Table 1 below. The proposed project is located in flat terrain, previously used for sugar cane cultivation and livestock, now employed for growing vegetables and aromatic plants classified as Cobbly alluvial land (Cn), surrounded by farmland, 10 meters above mean sea level. The terrain has been cleared of vegetation at and around the property since the 1980s, as shown in historic aerial imagery available in Google Earth Pro. No historic ruins are evident in the aerial images after vegetation clearing. The south coast is 0.14 miles south of the property. The closest fresh-water bodies include an intermittent stream 0.02 miles northeast of the property, and Quebrada Florida 0.80 miles northeast of the property. There is one Phase 1A archaeological study within a half-mile radius, by Rodríguez López (1985), with negative results, listed in Table 2.

The proposed project is located in flat terrain, previously used for sugar cane cultivation and livestock, now employed for growing vegetables and aromatic plants, classified as Cobbly alluvial land (Cn), surrounded by farmland, 10 meters above mean sea level. The terrain has been cleared of vegetation at and around the property since the 1980s, as shown in historic aerial imagery available in Google Earth Pro. No historic ruins are evident in aerial images after any episodes of vegetation clearing. The proposed project area is not within the boundaries or visual APE of any NRHP listed/eligible historic properties, or to a Traditional Urban Center or Historic District. 


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
Project (Parcel) Location – Area of Potential Effect Map (Aerial)





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


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


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Project (Parcel) Location with Previously Recorded Cultural Resources - Aerial Map





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

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Cultural Resource District Polygon



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




